ARTICLE FROM PASTOR WRIGHT

"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." (1 Peter 2:9, ESV).

Grace, mercy, and peace be to you, the saints at Holy Cross, from God our Father, and from our Lord and Redeemer Jesus Christ!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Please forgive such a long letter as I begin my service to you as vacancy pastor this month, but I wish for you to begin to get to know a little about me. I'm Pastor Wright, and by the grace of God, I have been blessed to serve the saints at Zion, Hampton, for the past 24+ years, and now, blessed also to serve you, the saints at Holy Cross (very temporarily, Lord willing)!

I was born and grew up in Ohio (Go Buckeyes!), and I attended two of our fine synodical schools— Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I was ordained into the office of the holy ministry almost 37 years ago (1987) and have served congregations in California (vicarage), Michigan (a dual parish), Iowa (Holy Cross in Davenport), and currently, Zion in Hampton.

In my personal life, I have been blessed in so many ways—chief among them is the gift of my wonderful wife of 30 years, Karen, and also our two adult children, Justin (28) and Katie (25).

I am also a bit of a "Car Guy" and am in the process of restoring a 1939 LaSalle sedan, so, next to talking to others about Jesus, I love talking about cars!

I have enjoyed being a part of the Rock Island Circuit for the past 24+ years and have enjoyed getting to know all three of your previous pastors—Haake, Laux (who was a seminary classmate of mine), and Karsten and their families.

While you must bid farewell to a beloved pastor and friend, I, too, feel a touch of sadness, for I have come to know Pastor Karsten not just as a colleague and brother in the ministry but as a friend and confidant!

By grace alone, Holy Cross has prospered under his capable hand, and indeed, your partnership has been mutually encouraging! You have nurtured both Pastor and Lynette with your friendship and love. A lasting bond has been forged by all that you have shared together. He has personally shared with me on several occasions that his ministry would not have been nearly as effective or rewarding without your help. But as all faithful shepherds do, Pastor Karsten is one to pray that God's will be done in all things.

God responded to that prayer, and Pastor listened and responded to God's guidance, as difficult as that decision must have been.

There is still much to be accomplished for the Kingdom at Holy Cross, and perhaps this is a good time to remind ourselves just what the Church of Christ truly is—by God's grace, we are his people receiving His gifts in Word and Sacrament and living out our lives in service to Christ, even as we serve one another with the gospel of grace. St. Peter said it well in the passage quoted above, when he wrote that we are a chosen people, called to share the excellencies of Christ. Ministry doesn't come to an end when a faithful shepherd retires or leaves for service in some other part of the Kingdom, and so perhaps this vacancy can be a time in which we each take more seriously what it means to be children of God by grace and put into greater practice the universal priesthood of all believers.

I have taken the opportunity to meet with Pastor Karsten and the leadership of Holy Cross to better understand the needs of your congregation and how I may best serve during this hopefully brief time before you secure the services of the shepherd who will lead you into the next chapter of life at Holy Cross.

As my duty is first to Zion—the congregation that the Lord of the Church has called me to shepherd—it will be necessary to prioritize the various needs of Holy Cross and concentrate on those that are of primary importance. The saints of Zion are gracious enough to share me with you! Unfortunately, due to having to balance the schedules of two congregations at once, as well as service to a non-church (secular) employer, I will not be able to participate in each and every facet of Holy Cross's ministry. Many other things will require my attention throughout the week, so expect that I will be unavailable at times. Other pastors may be called upon to serve from time to time when schedules conflict. Rev. Joel Brondos has agreed to assist wherever needed, so you will be seeing much of him during this vacancy. Count on me, however, to do all within my ability to help you through this time of transition.

Please understand that much of the burden of the vacancy will fall on your new office secretary, Hope, so please be understanding, patient, and supportive of her if she looks a bit wearied and overworked as she adjusts to her new role. Perhaps, too, you might be able to volunteer to do something to help lighten her load!

During my time of service to you, I pledge to you my faithfulness to God's Holy Word and to our Lutheran Confessions. I promise to carry out all duties that we have mutually agreed upon in conjunction with your congregational chairman and Board of Elders and in an evangelical (gospel-centered) manner, and above all, to seek the spiritual welfare of all the members of Holy Cross.

Rev. Timothy Nerud, our Rock Island Circuit Visitor, will continue to be available to guide you through the process of calling a faithful pastor! You will also continue to have the assistance of our Central Illinois District President, Rev. Michael Mohr, in this regard. Both will serve you well. I have great confidence in both of these men of God.

Also, I make this request: I would ask for your prayers for my work among you, so that all we accomplish together in this time of pastoral vacancy will be to the glory of our Lord alone and for the good of many.

Finally, please pray often on behalf of the pastor, who is known at this time to God alone but who will be your future shepherd, asking God to prepare him for fruitful service in your midst. Pray also, asking God to prepare your hearts to receive his ministry in your midst. And pray for Pastor Karsten and his family that he be blessed in his retirement.



From the Vicar: "For we did not follow cunningly devised fables when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewitnesses of His majesty. For He received from God the Father honor and glory when such a voice came to Him from the Excellent Glory: "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." And we heard this voice which came from heaven when we were with Him on the holy mountain. And so we have the prophetic word confirmed, which you do well to heed as a light that shines in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts; knowing this first, that no prophecy of Scripture is of any private interpretation, for prophecy never came by the will of man, but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit." 2 Peter 1:16-21

The Christian faith is one which is transmitted by the repetition of the testimony of trustworthy witnesses. The apostles and the evangelists who shared the Gospel and recorded their words testify to us concerning what they heard and saw, concerning the person of Jesus, concerning God becoming a man and making Himself the sacrifice for our sins. Before them Moses and the prophets also wrote to testify of the great works of God and how He would save the world from the clutches of sin, to take away the power of the devil, and to turn death into everlasting life.

Their writings are not a reflection of their imaginations. They are not as Peter says, a collection of private interpretations or personal opinions about God. These writings are the Scriptures, the writings which are the true revelation of God and the true testimony of His power, love, and mercy. The men who wrote these books and scrolls and letters did not compose them by themselves or for themselves, "but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit."

Critics of Christianity will say that our beliefs are the result of an evolution in philosophy, that our Scriptures demonstrate a growing and changing tradition. First, they say, that Moses (or whoever wrote Genesis) was inspired by older mythology and from this foundation was built up the writings of the Old and New Testaments, as men used their imaginations and experiences to apply the concept of their creator-god to their circumstances. This probably reveals more about the critics than it does about our Scriptures or our religion.

The truth of the matter is that the Scriptures are writings made by men which reveal the true God. More than this, Peter reminds us that the very words of Scripture are from God Himself, He is their source and it is the Holy Spirit who reveals God to mankind by these words. Jesus came as the Word of God in the flesh, to proclaim what was given to Him by the Father, and the Holy Spirit continues to declare the words of the Son. Jesus has proven Himself true by His words and deeds and the writers of the New Testament "were eyewitnesses of His majesty".

In the Christian Church we teach nothing but what God has given us to say, the words which our Lord has given us to guide us in all matters of life and practice and belief, the words in which we place our full confidence.

I am very grateful for the time I have had with you, to learn to teach the Word of God in the study, the classroom, and in your pulpit. I am grateful for you dear brothers and sisters, who love the testimony of the prophets and saints and eagerly come to hear it. I give thanks to God for this, and pray that I may be counted worthy to begin the work of sharing Christ's Word and Gifts only one short year from now. It has been a pleasure to be with all of you fine Christians, I am sure that God is at work on your behalf for the sake of Christ Jesus our Lord. Together we wait eagerly to see what God will do next!

The Good Shepherds (Bible Class - July)


In Jeremiah 3:15, the Lord promised, "And I will give you shepherds according to My heart, who will feed you with knowledge and understanding." Jesus called His apostles to spread the Gospel from Jerusalem, through Judea and Samaria, and to all the world.

Through the month of July, we will study The Pastoral Epistles (1 & 2 Timothy and Titus), considering how the Lord used the apostle Paul to prepare and appoint faithful shepherds for His people. In this light, we will also review the process in detail about how pastors in The LCMS are called to serve congregations today..

Surrounded by Witnesses (Bible Class - August)

For those who have been attending church for decades, it may seem that the historic liturgy is boring or vain repetition. In this Bible study, however, we will note how much of the liturgy is actually God's Word as it first appeared in the lives God's people. In a practical and vibrant way, these sessions will help enrich and deepen our worship life and appreciation for Word and Sacrament in a way that has proven tried-and-true over the centuries.

Pr. Joel A. Brondos:has served as a parish pastor and as a parochial headmaster of classical Lutheran schools for over 30 years in urban, suburban, and rural settings (retiring in 2019). July 4th is Independence Day for the United States of America, and I am sure you celebrate it. Mexico has an Independence Day, also.

The citizens of Mexico all over the world relive the night of September 15th, 1810 when the parish priest, Miguel Hidalgo, called on his townspeople to take arms against the Spaniards who had been ruling Mexico since the days of the Conquest in 1521.

El Grito (The Shout), every 16th of September is the Mexican Fiesta par excellence! Streets, houses, buildings and cars are decorated everywhere in the country. On every street corner there are vendors selling flags, balloons,

and hats, all with green, white and red, the national colors. Flags wave from practically every house and building.

It is customary for the current President to deliver The Grito at the National Palace in Mexico City. The original bell rung by Hidalgo is the bell that is rung every 16th of September. The ceremony reaches the high point when the crowd joins in proudly shouting out the names of the heroes of Independence and ends with the exciting: Viva Mexico!

When The Grito ceremony ends, the sky lights up with multicolored fireworks that shower hearts with the pride of knowing that Mexico is a free and independent nation.

Why I am talking about liberty? Just read Galatians 5:1 "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery." We have the true liberty in Christ for these reasons:

Because of His love for us, He suffered and died on the cross. Because of this we are now His children. His suffering, death and resurrection have reconciled us with God, our sins having been forgiven; and we now are filled with His peace. While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us thus securing forgiveness for our sins and eternal salvation. It is by grace through faith in Christ's redeeming work that we obtain this salvation.Nations may celebrate their Independence Day on a determined day, but for the children of God, liberty is constant! Let us remember that many of them grew up in the Roman Catholic Church where they learned very little about the Bible and even less about the true teachings of God's Word.

It should be added that there are also gentlemen in the group who have Pentecostal beliefs and so it is with them that I spend more time showing the correct interpretation of Scripture, always showing Christian love without falling into doctrinal controversy.

The LWML CID has provided additional 100 Bible Stories books which will be given to a gentleman when he is released from the correctional center. Chaplain Weber will do this. With the donated book comes information about LCMS Hispanic ministries in the Chicago area and surrounding communities. Some of the gentlemen have the option of purchasing a radio and listening to the program on KALA, which I do on Saturdays from 7-8 am.
