Pastor's Newsletter Article for April 2025 HOW IS JESUS THE SAVIOR OF THE WORLD?

Lenten and Holy Week blessings, dear sisters and brothers in Christ!

In the midst of the chaos and terror of World War II, a story of selfless sacrifice emerged. On February 3, 1943, the U.S. Army transport ship Dorchester was torpedoed by a German U-boat *(submarine).* As the ship sank, four chaplains worked tirelessly to calm the panicked soldiers,



guiding them to safety and distributing life jackets. When the supply of life jackets ran out, these four men gave their own to others, linking arms and praying as the ship went down. Their ultimate act of love, giving their lives so that others might live, stands as a testament to their faith active in love for others. Their selfless deed was even memorialized on a US postage stamp! These chaplains, in their final moments, mirrored the very essence of Christ's sacrifice. These heroic chaplains

sacrificed their lives so that others were spared. These chaplains were lifesavers in the sense that they <u>substituted</u> their own lives for the lives of others.

We refer to Jesus as a lifesaver. Jesus saved our lives and the lives of every single human being. Just as those four chaplains offered the ultimate sacrifice, We Christians understand Jesus as the <u>ultimate</u> Lifesaver. He didn't merely rescue us from a sinking ship, but from something far greater: **The weight of sin and the separation from God.** This is an amazing claim, isn't it? How could one person's life have such a all-encompassing impact on all of humanity? The answer lies in Jesus' role as our **SUBSTITUTE**.

The Bible paints a clear picture of God's perfect holiness, righteousness, and justice. We, on the other hand, fall far short of God's ideal. As the apostle Paul reminds us: "None is righteous, no, not one...All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one who does good, not even one" (Romans 3:10, 12). This reveals the depth of our need for a Savior. We are, by our very nature, separated from God by our imperfections. We are unable to close that gap by ourselves.

Our sinful nature creates a separation between us and God, who is perfectly holy. Left to our own devices, this separation would mean we could not dwell in God's presence for eternity. As Romans 6:23 reminds us, *"The wages of sin is death."* Without intervention, this separation leads to a destiny of eternal separation from God in eternal torment *(Matthew 13:49, 50).* This is a sobering reality, a weighty reminder of the depth of our need for God's grace. But this isn't the end of the story. It's precisely because of this separation that Jesus' sacrifice becomes so intensely meaningful. He came to bridge this gap, to offer us a path to reconciliation with God, and to offer us eternal life in his presence.

God intervened! We have a lifesaver! We have a **SUBSTITUTE!** In unimaginable love, God the Father sent his Son, Jesus, to save us from death and hell. As true God and true man, Jesus lived a holy and sinless life in our place. Jesus **substituted** his holiness for our lack of holiness, so that because of Jesus, God counts us completely holy!

In an act of breathtaking humility and boundless love, Jesus stepped into our place. On the cross, he endured the agony of separation from God the Father—a separation we deserved. He bore the weight of our sins, the very punishment that should have been ours. In this profound act of substitution, God placed Jesus under the sentence of death, reconciling us to the Father, and offering eternal life.

And then, in a glorious display of divine power, Jesus rose victoriously from the dead! This resurrection is the ultimate proof that he fully accomplished our salvation. Through his perfect life and his sacrificial death, he triumphed over sin, death, and hell, rescuing the world from their grasp. He is the Savior, the risen Lord, who offers us not only forgiveness but also the assurance of eternal life.

Placing your trust in Jesus, your Savior, your **SUBSTITUTE**, means that all these eternal blessings are yours! Embrace his gift of forgiveness, and experience the joy of a life lived in his grace. As Lutheran hymn writer Paul Gerhardt reminds us¹ in his Holy Week that Jesus did it all:

Upon the cross extended See, world, your Lord suspended. Your Savior yields His breath. The Prince of Life from heaven Himself has freely given To shame and blows and bitter death. Your soul in griefs unbounded, Your head with thorns surrounded, You died to ransom me. The cross for me enduring, The crown for me securing, You healed my wounds and set me free.



Organist Workshop

Holy Cross has for decades '*played*' an active role in the formation of church workers. True to this tradition and generous sponsors Amanda Hahn and Julia Koester will this summer be attending Organist Workshops provided by Concordia Theological Seminary Ft. Wayne. Amanda has enrolled in the Beginning Level workshop, June 1–6 and Julia the Intermediate and Advanced Level, June 8–13, 2025.

Class sizes are limited to ensure appropriate student/instructor ratios. Each workshop begins with registration on Sunday evening. The first session begins Monday at 8:15 a.m., and the last session concludes on Friday at noon. Instruction is customized to the ability level of each student. Daily classes in playing technique and theology are part of the curriculum, as is practice time.

Students receive customized instruction based on ability level in the following areas:

- Registration
- Keyboard and pedal technique
- Leading congregational singing at the organ and/or piano through effective playing
- Hymn introductions
- Ideas for playing various settings of the Divine Service and daily prayer services (Matins, Vespers, etc.)
- Repertoire ideas
- Leading challenging hymns





First Project of 2025 - Update

As of the end of February 2025, Dollar for Missions is well underway on its first project for this year. The project is masonry and tuckpointing work at University Lutheran Church, Champaign. In fact, after two months of 2025 this project is over halfway toward completion. The target amount is \$25,000. At the end of February, DFM has \$13,849.91 toward this project. 
