WHY IS JESUS' RESURRECTION FROM THE DEAD SIGNIFICANT FOR ME?

Life can change in a heartbeat. One moment, joy; the next, sorrow. Have you ever had a moment that was both incredibly joyful and deeply painful? Think about Lisa's experience: One minute, she's enjoying a beautiful day with her mom and baby... and the next, a sudden health crisis turns everything upside down, and her mom is gone. It's heartbreaking.

What stood out, though, was Lisa's response. Even through the tears, she kept saying things like, "We ask that God's will be done," and "I'm glad she is in Jesus' arms." It reminded me of Martha in the Bible, grieving her brother Lazarus but still voicing her confident declaration to Jesus, ***"I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the last day"*** (John 11:24).

Where does this incredible confidence come from and how can we share that confidence—that refreshing hope in the face of loss and even our own mortality? It's a question we all wrestle with, isn't it? The truth is, ever since sin entered the world, death has become a reality for all of us. We've all lost people we love. We know that death is a reality we all will eventually face. And the Bible is clear: our sin separates us from God and deserves His judgment.

So, how can we have that same confidence that Lisa and Martha had?

Because we have a Savior who loved us enough to die for us! Think about it: where we fall short, Jesus perfectly loved and obeyed God. He willingly went to the cross to take the punishment we deserve. His love completely wipes away our guilt.



But the story doesn't end there! Jesus didn't just die; he ***rose again!*** **We also have a Savior who is alive!** Jesus' resurrection isn't just a one-day celebration each year. It's the ***guarantee*** that everything He promised is true. It's the ***"firstfruits"*** of our own resurrection.

Let me explain that ***"firstfruits"*** idea. In the Old Testament, when farmers harvested their crops, they would give the first and best part to God as an offering.

This “*firstfruits*” offering was really important because it showed that *everything* belonged to God. It was like saying, “This little bit represents the whole harvest – all the wheat, all the barley, everything!” It signified that the *entire* harvest belonged to God and was sure to follow.

The Apostle Paul uses this idea to explain Jesus’ resurrection. He calls Jesus “*the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep*” (1 Corinthians 15:20). Jesus rising from the dead is like that first part of the harvest, guaranteeing that *we* will also be raised to life! Because Jesus, our head, has risen, we, who are connected to him, will also rise. It’s a sure thing!

Chad Bird, former LCMS pastor, seminary professor, and Hebrew and Old Testament scholar, offers this helpful illustration: “If someone is lying down and gets up, their head comes up first, and then the rest of their body follows. Jesus, our ‘*Head,*’ rose first, and we, His ‘*Body,*’ (*the Church*) will follow him in the resurrection on the Last Day.”

So, just as the Old Testament “*firstfruits*” offering promised a full harvest, Jesus’ resurrection promises our own. It’s not just an isolated event; it’s the beginning of something amazing! It’s a living reality that shapes our present and secures our future.

That’s why we can be confident, like Lisa and Martha! We can say with joy, “*I know that my Redeemer lives!*” In every moment, whether happy or sad, we can find comfort, hope, and refreshment in that truth. And when our time on earth is done, we will wake up to live forever with our Savior because **our Redeemer lives!**

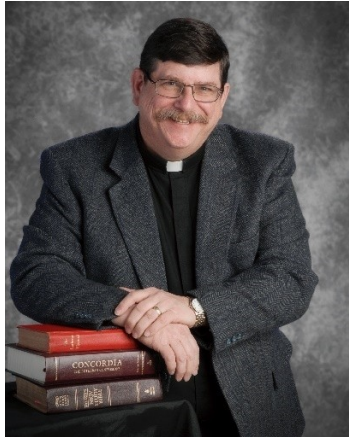

As we celebrate our Lord's resurrection, let us turn our attention to Mary of Magdala. John records that she was weeping in sadness outside the garden tomb until she heard the voice of Jesus call her by name, talk to her, and send her to share the good news with the others. It is a touching scene and one that captures the Easter joy that overcomes all sadness. The popular hymn, *In the Garden*, was written to express Mary's unique experience of literally speaking face-to-face with her risen Savior. It would be wrong to use this hymn out of context to apply it to our perceived spiritual experiences. Rather, our Easter experience takes us to our baptism, where Christ called us by name to belong to Him.

That is when we were united with Christ's resurrection to live new and everlasting lives. In our weekly Divine Service, we continue to experience a mini-Easter as Jesus comes to us, not alone in a garden or on a golf course but gathered together in His house. There, He walks and talks with us through His Word and Sacrament, turning our weeping into a joy that can never be taken away. Then, like Mary, He sends us to share all that He has said and declare to them, "Christ is risen! He is risen, Indeed! Alleluia!"

CID BOARD OF DIRECTORS REVIEW REPORT 03/18/25

Rev. Mark Eddy called the meeting to order. Rev. Mike Burdick gave the opening devotion on Psalm 90, reminding us that the Lord is our dwelling place.

Pastor Adam Rouse led a mission Presentation regarding Immanuel Lutheran Chapel, Springfield. Pastor Rouse gave a history of Immanuel Lutheran Church and Chapel and the current work and teaching on evangelism and outreach studies. Pastor Rouse is hopeful and heartened about where Immanuel Lutheran Chapel is headed.

One-third of CID congregations have registered their delegates to the 2025 District Convention. Please check if your congregation has registered its delegates. Nominations for District President are due by May 18. Thanks to all who have filled out Witness Slips for HB 2827, "The Homeschool Act." All LCMS Illinois District Presidents signed a letter explaining this bill's adverse effects on our LCMS Schools in Illinois. Because the State legislature has amended the bill, Witness Slips need to be filled out again. The Small Church Summit on June 7th is at Trinity, Taylorville. Every congregation should receive Witnessing Helps posters to aid in teaching Christian witnessing and practicing Christian witnessing. CID BOD approved funding for CUEnet training for a student interested in future deaf ministry in CID.

Trinity, Stewardson's revised constitution was approved. CID 2026 Compensation Guidelines were approved to include church worker sabbaticals. Sabbaticals are not merely to be "time off," but rather a period of reflection and renewal to encourage and motivate church workers in their vocation.

Jesus' Resurrection Is a Real Fact.

The Holy Scriptures tell us that many saw Jesus alive. This included Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Salome (Mat.28; Mar.16), Joanna and the others with them. (Luke. 24:10). In addition, the disciples (Mar.16:14; John 20:19-29), Cleopas and the other disciple (Luke 24:13-35), more five hundred at the same time (1Cor.15:6), and lastly, the apostle Paul (1Cor.15:8) saw the Risen Christ.

Christ's resurrection is a real fact! The apostles gave constant testimony about it, and it was the central theme of their entire preaching. Acts 4:33 and Acts 5:40-42 says: *"They called the apostles in and had them flogged. Then they ordered them not to speak in the name of Jesus, and let them go. The apostles left the Sanhedrin, rejoicing because they had been counted worthy of suffering disgrace for the Name. Day after day, in the temple courts and from house to house, they never stopped teaching and proclaiming the good news that Jesus is the Messiah."*

Surely, they left the Sanhedrin in physical pain from the flogging they had received. Surely, they left tired and worried about the future. When we are "flogged" by hardships, are we hurting with anguish for all that is happening around us? Has the joy gone out of our lives? Diseases can crush us. We can become discouraged when work and income are not easy to find. We can be filled with hatred and anger against those who hurt us. How can we smile when the wind is against us? At these times, is God our ever present source of help and comfort?

It's my prayer that you continue faithful in serving our Lord. Have you been affronted because of Jesus' name? If the answer is yes, remember to trust in the Lord because nothing will extinguish the joy in your heart on having suffered for Christ's cause and for the preaching of the Gospel.



In Mexico Mothers' Day is always celebrated on May 10th. It is the most beloved and important festival of the year for the family. It is a tradition that the children sing songs to their mothers on this day. We call it "serenata". A serenata consists of songs sung in the early morning with live music. Some hire a group of musicians with acoustic guitars. Others employ "The Mariachi", (The Mariachi is a group of musicians who play traditional folk music with guitars, trumpets, and violins) or friends with acoustic guitars may form a group and travel to their mothers' houses and sing two or three songs. Upon finishing the songs, the mother must leave the house and thank the

children personally with a hug and a kiss.

On this day, the mothers also receive gifts: flowers, hugs, kisses and a lot of love from their children in appreciation. It is also a custom to observe festivals for the mothers in the elementary schools, where the students carry out dance numbers, interpret some songs and perform some recitations like poems for mothers. Mothers are so pleased when they see their children doing something for them. In many schools the students do some handcrafts, like a decoration for the house for their mothers. Children give it to them on Mother's Day.

Many families are accustomed to being together to celebrate with their moms. They bring a special meal or some plates while others make reservations in a restaurant. The idea is to spend major time with their moms in order to honor them on their special day. At Cristo Rey we are going to celebrate Mothers' Day.

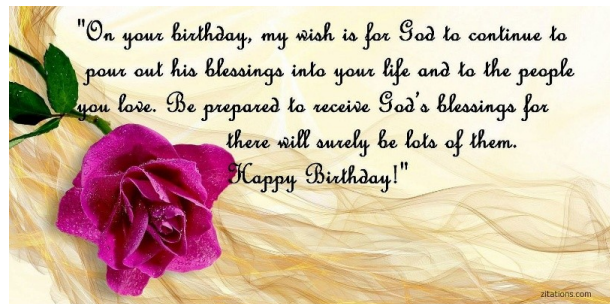
