What Does the Holy Spirit Do for Us?

A renowned doctor once conducted a series of autopsies and made a startling discovery. After examining the body of a convicted **murderer**, he noticed something unusual—an internal problem. When he compared it to the body of a convicted **thief**, he found the exact same issue. Curious, he revisited notes from other cases. Time and again, he uncovered the same diagnosis. Regardless of background, **every person** had the same internal condition.

That doctor? His name is Jesus.

In Mark 7, Jesus tells us plainly that all kinds of evil—anger, envy, deceit, pride—come from within, from the heart. That's the common thread: **a heart problem.** When someone cuts you off on the road and your first reaction is NOT to smile and wave, it comes **from within the heart.** When someone hurts



your feelings and you want to hurt them back, it comes **from** within the heart. When you say something in anger that you immediately want to take back, the problem doesn't begin with our circumstances. It begins within us—in the heart.

So what's the solution to a heart problem like this?

King David said it best: "Create in me a clean heart, O God" (Psalm 51:10). We don't just need behavior modification. We need new hearts—and only God can create them.

Enter the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit doesn't use a scalpel, but something far sharper: the Word of God. With it, He performs divine heart surgery—cutting, yes, but only to heal. Through the Word, the Spirit convicts us of sin and then comforts us with the Gospel: "The blood of Jesus purifies us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). The Spirit changes our hearts so they beat with faith, hope, and love. From hearts renewed by the Gospel flow peace, patience, kindness, and goodness. If you believe in Christ today, thank the Holy Spirit. He gave you a new heart!

On Sunday, June 8, we will celebrate the Festival of Pentecost—the day the Holy Spirit descended with wind, fire, and the miracle of many languages. But if you keep reading in Acts, you'll notice that the spectacle of Pentecost quickly gave way to the daily life of the Church, marked not by constant miracles, but by fellowship, worship, repentance, and perseverance.

This is how the Spirit usually works: not with fireworks, but through the ordinary, the broken, and the humble. The Word may look like just ink on a page or simple speech.

The Sacraments may appear to be plain water, bread, and wine. Yet through these means, the Holy Spirit is powerfully at work—comforting the sinner, strengthening the weary, building the Church.

Holy Cross is not a perfect place, but it is a place where the perfect grace of Christ is offered regularly. It is a community of ordinary people—a refuge and a source of strength for the imperfect and the struggling... but people who are being shaped and sustained by the Spirit through Word and Sacrament, nevertheless. This is especially important during a time of transition. The Holy Spirit's power doesn't depend on whether a pastor is permanent or interim (or as I often put it, "a clerical Kelly girl")—it depends on the faithfulness of God's promises, which never change.

This congregation's gathering each week around Word and Sacrament is itself an act of faith and a testimony to God's ongoing work. As St. Paul reminds us, "God's strength is made perfect in weakness" (2 Corinthians 12:9). That applies to churches in times of transition too. That's why it's so crucial for everyone to be in the divine service each Sunday—We need each other!

While we await clarity on a future pastor, let us rest in what is already certain: God's love for His people, the unchanging truth of His Word, the grace poured out in Baptism and the Lord's Supper, and the quiet, steady presence of the Holy Spirit. These are not small things. These are everything.

I encourage you to see God's hand not only in grand events but in the regular rhythm of worship, the fellowship of believers, and the faithful proclamation of Christ crucified and risen. The Spirit is at work here. Right now. Among us.

Come each Sunday to be renewed again by His powerful grace... And pray for the man who may (if the Holy Spirit so leads) serve you next—knowing that even now, the Spirit is already at work in his heart, too!

I am very impressed with the direction that both of our seminaries are heading, driving us ever deeper into the Word and our confessions under the headship of the new presidents who are cooperating to strengthen the unity of our dear synod. For our part, I am inspired by my classmates and am proud of the men they have become. I have full confidence in each one of them as they begin their life's work as parish pastors. The support we all have received has not only provided us with this education and blessed vocation, but also the fraternity and mutual support in seminary and for life. From the bottom of my heart, thank you for your help and for playing a part in God's ongoing work in this world through His church. May God continue to bless us all richly, guard us in body and soul, and preserve us for the Kingdom which has no end.



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CID BOARD OF DIRECTORS REVIEW REPORT 05/20/25

Opening devotion was given by Rev. Mike Burdick on Psalm 127.

Pastor Hull, campus ministry pastor at Western Illinois University, gave a Mission Presentation. He shared the blessings of his first year of service at Western, including four confirmations. Pastor Hull holds a weekly Bible class and hosts 6-8 students for supper. There are plans for monthly disputations on ethical topics in the upcoming academic year at Western, where Pastor Hull will have the opportunity to give a public confession and defense of Christianity.

President Mohr's report included this year's candidate placements from both seminaries. There were 145 requests for candidates with 92 candidates assigned, with 53 requests unfilled. Three Candidates were placed into CID in addition to one deaconess.

A New CID Personnel Handbook was approved.

Revised constitutions were approved for St. John's, Campaign; Christ, Clinton; Calvary, Watseka; and St. Paul's, Woodworth.

A late Overture to Launch a Funding Campaign for Mission Support in the Central Illinois District was approved. Another late Overture to Establish a Date for District Convention was approved.

There will be a Zoom Board meeting to call a part-time District Mission Executive in early June 2025.



In almost all offices and workplaces, there are secretaries whose work is very important. When I worked in Monterrey, there was a secretary who was excellent at her job. When the boss asked for a special work report, she already had it for him, because she had prepared it in advance so it would be ready when he requested it. She was very efficient, although the person to whom the credit was given was often not her, but her boss. In a sense, the work of the Holy Spirit is like that of an efficient and excellent, much better than a secretary. The Holy Spirit works in anonymity, behind the scenes as such, but He is perfectly efficient and excellent.



We speak much of God the Father, since we address many of our prayers to Him. We talk a lot about Jesus', the Son of God, and what He did for us on the cross, but when we little mention the Holy Spirit, it does not mean that He is inactive. Far from it! The Holy Spirit is the third person of the Holy Trinity and is always active, working in our hearts to lead us to Christ. The Holy Spirit is like the beating heart in each one of us. We do not know how this vital organ works, nor do we know how many liters of blood pass through it. All we know is that the heart is there pumping all the blood that runs through the veins

and arteries of our body and does this without us noticing it. It's the same with the Holy Spirit. His work is important and indispensable for our spiritual health and our salvation.

This Sunday, June 8, the church celebrates Pentecost which is one of the most important Christian holidays. We then enter the church season of Pentecost. It is the day that a great change began in the life of the early Christian church. Many say that Pentecost is the birthday of the church. On this day, there was a tremendous change!

The change of the disciples. After the death of Jesus, the disciples were frightened. They felt that God had abandoned them. They hid together in one place, separated from the bustle of people who walked and celebrated in the streets. They were afraid of being persecuted and taken to the dungeon. They also feared that their lives might end on the cross, also. That is why they were all hidden under one roof, full of fear of being seen in the light.

But Pentecost came nonetheless. The disciples heard the wind coming from the sky, and tongues of fire perched on their heads. They felt the strengthening presence of the Holy Spirit which Jesus had promised them as recorded in Acts 1: 8. He told them to wait for the Holy Spirit and that when He came, they would receive power and be the most vigorous witnesses to the Gospel to everyone.

And that's exactly what happened at Pentecost. The Holy Spirit encouraged them to take to the streets and start vigorously proclaiming the message of salvation in Jesus Christ. They have nothing to fear anymore; God is in their hearts; God is in their words; God is in their bodies and minds.

God Himself gave them the strength and enabled them to speak without fear. And that was what they did! All left the place where they had been hiding and began to speak in foreign languages they had never learned. They talked about Jesus and what He had done.

<u>The change of the crowd</u>. Peter, standing, addressed the crowd and gave a wonderful and glorious sermon. Indeed, a change had been made! The Lord touched and changed the hearts of the people, and that day 3000 people were added to the church.

<u>Today God wants to make the same kind of change.</u> There are still many who do not believe in Jesus. They do not know that there is a heaven that God offers for those who believe in His Son. There are still many Christians, who like the disciples are afraid, inactive and do not share the Gospel with their friends and family, because they think that there will be no change.

The change is made only by God. The fire of the Holy Spirit is in us whenever we listen, read and meditate on the Word of God, and when we partake of the sacrament and remember our baptism.

May God the Holy Spirit help you to change, fill your heart and encourage you to share Jesus without any fear. Amen.
